Dear Consultee,

Consultation on a proposal to reconfigure existing services to schools to support them to meet the needs of primary aged children with Specific Learning Difficulties (SpLD) by 31 August 2018.

The vast majority of students identified with SpLD in Hertfordshire currently have their needs met in their local mainstream schools with outreach support from a number of bases across the county. A review has identified that an enhanced service can be provided in a different way. Technically that will require the closure of the bases.

What is the proposal?

To reconfigure staffing into four teams as part of the Special Education Needs and Disability (SEND) Special Advice and Support Service under the overall line management of the County Lead for Specialist Advice and Support. This will enhance the current offer with additional expertise from within the central service which includes staff with higher levels of SpLD training and expertise.

To do this it will be necessary to close the SpLD Outreach Bases located in the following schools on 31 August 2018 and to provide support for students from staff working out of the 4 Integrated Services for Learning (ISL) areas.

Why is it proposed to close the SpLD bases?

SpLD Bases were established 20 years ago to provide services to local schools with the aim of supporting schools in their localities to better meet SpLD needs. They provide a broad range of outreach services including universal early intervention support, specialist, and targeted support for students with complex needs.

Over time schools have increased their capacity to identify and meet the needs of young people. This has gone hand in hand with a recognition of the high incidence of SPLD within each school and an increased expectation on all schools that they will meet the needs of children with SPLD from within their own resources.

An internal review carried out in 2015 by the Educational Psychology Service identified that services were being delivered differently across the County. It concluded that support could be enhanced by reconfiguring the way it was organised. That process started within the secondary sector, and the two secondary bases were closed in August 2016. This proposal concentrates on the primary sector.

How will the needs of primary aged students with Specific Learning Difficulties continue to be met?

The vast majority of students identified with SpLD in Hertfordshire currently have their needs met in their local mainstream schools. Currently one student in the county accesses Exceptional Needs Funding (ENF) to support their specific learning difficulties. A further 97 students have an Education Health and Care Plan identifying SpLD as their primary need, the majority of these children are now in post 16 provision. As from September 2017 there will be 10 children with EHC plans naming SpLD as a primary need in primary schools and 41 in secondary schools, and 13 of the 41 being educated in a special school.

Individually allocated pupil-led funding provided to schools will continue to be available for the students with higher level (exceptional) needs requiring support over and above a school's ordinarily available provision.

The County will continue to provide outreach services, increasingly targeting resources to support complex needs where it would not be expected that a school might have the necessary level of expertise.

To ensure that services are provided effectively and consistently it is proposed to close the bases and reconfigure staffing into four teams as part of the SEND Specialist Advice and Support Service under the overall line management of the County Lead for Complex Needs. This will enhance the current offer with additional expertise from within the central service which includes staff with higher levels of SPLD training and expertise.

What would this mean for students and staff?

Those children who have received targeted input from the newly configured local outreach service will continue to have their needs planned, monitored and reviewed by their school and will have access to an outreach service.

Each base is currently staffed by teaching and admin staff, some of whom are currently on fixed-term contracts. The proposal is to transfer a number of those staff to the Central SEND Specialist Advice and Support Service and to create a single Lead Practitioner county-wide role to support and oversee and ensure high quality continuing professional development for Service staff.

The SpLD advisory teachers would become part of the Specialist Advice and Support Service. They would spend the majority of their time visiting and providing services to schools and targeted and specialist work with children. They would have the benefit of being part of the four local ISL teams. Initially SpLD teachers will be allocated across the county using model indicator data to ensure fair and equitable distribution of resources.

The service will further develop the principles of outreach in line with the Specialist Advisory Teacher model delivered by Integrated Services for Learning (ISL).

Reasonable steps will be taken to avoid compulsory redundancies should this be necessary. Where compulsory redundancy cannot be avoided individuals would be identified from a relevant pool of staff following the application of selection criteria confirmed during consultation with employee representatives (trade unions/professional associations).

Existing libraries of resources are proposed to be available on short term loans to local settings, as are other special needs resources in localities.

What educational improvement does this offer for students with specific learning difficulties?

Networks of groups and workshops have developed over time to share expertise on effective resources and assistive technology to increase confidence in local schools to identify and assess need and in turn to assist with planning effective programmes of support. This approach is endorsed through the Code of Practice (2015) assess, plan, do, review framework.

SpLD provision operates to build capacity in local schools to meet the needs of Hertfordshire students locally. The decline in the numbers of requests for SpLD support from schools is indicative of needs being met within local schools.

Staff in local schools are equipped to recognise and identify special educational needs, and put early intervention strategies into place. These strategies, alongside a regular process of review and evaluation will further enable young people to receive early and effective support in their local school alongside their peers. Where more specialised input is required, educational settings will continue to have access to Advisory teaching support that will be co-ordinated monitored and delivered alongside other Integrated Services for Learning (ISL) Specialist services.

Have your say
